# Aiding the Reconstruction through Tourism SL Ginga Tetsudo Steam Train to Open April 12



JR East's Morioka Branch Office has announced that the steam locomotive "SL Ginga Tetsudo" will begin running on the Kamaishi Line between Hanamaki and Kamaishi stations (90.2 km) on Saturday, April 12.

This is being done to promote regional development and reconstruction aid through tourism in the Tohoku region. The train itself was introduced as No. C58-239 in 1940, and ran on the Yamada Line until 1973, and will now be resurrected after more than 40 years of retirement.

The SL Ginga Tetsudo will make roughly 80 trips per year, mainly on weekends. On Saturdays it will leave Hanamaki Station at 10:37 a.m. and arrive at Kamaishi Station at 3:04 p.m., and on Sundays it will leave Kamaishi at 10:55 a.m. and arrive at Hanamaki at 3:20 p.m. As the trip takes around four and a half hours, the round trip will be made over two days.

The train seats 176 people, and tickets can be purchased up to one month prior to boarding.

Ignition of the SL Ginga Tetsudo was achieved in January of this year, with a lighting ceremony taking place in the square in front of Kamaishi Station. A prayer was offered for a strong recovery for the disaster-affected region. This will be a powerful push for the reconstruction along with April's complete reopening of the Sanriku Railway.

The event will run until March 23 (Sunday), and is open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Tasty goods from Iwate, Miyagi and Fukushima will make one-day appearances on Saturdays and Sundays during this period.

# Learning from the Experiences of Niigata Youth Opinion Exchange by People with Experience of Disasters

On Saturday, February 22, an opinion exchange meeting was held between young people in Otsuchi and survivors of the 2004 Niigata Chuetsu Earthquake. The event was organized by Oraga-Otsuchi Yumehiroba.

The goal of the event was for Otsuchi residents to learn from people their own age from the experiences of Yamakoshi Village (now part of Nagaoka City, Niigata) and work to improve Otsuchi's reconstruction.

Twelve citizens of Nagaoka in their 20s joined four students of Otsuchi High School and two Otsuchi-born university students.

The group was accompanied by the local guide Kazuki Tobai, who first took them to the former Otsuchi Town Hall where

#### Profile:

Originally from Yokota, Rikuzentakata, Matsuda was one of the founding members of Sakura Line 311, an initiative to plant cherry trees along the line that marks the furthest point the tsunami reached.

While working in Kanagawa Seiko's Iwate factory (Sumita) she also serves as the executive director of the Rikuzentakata Youth Organization Council.

Before the disaster, Matsuda was involved with traditional arts festivals and helped with the organization of taiko and performing arts demonstrations.

After the disaster, there were fewer opportunities to engage in these kind of activities, and so she decided to kill two birds with one stone by

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many people lost their lives, and then to Shiroyama Park, where one can see the whole town.

At the opinion exchange meeting, the Niigatans described Yamakoshi's efforts after their earthquake: what was effective, and what should have been done but wasn't. The two groups discussed what Otsuchi can do to carry out a better reconstruction.

Third year students at Otsuchi High School Takuma Sato and Taku Oguni said "We're going to start working in the local fire department and the town hall in April, so it's good that we were able to exchange information and make new contacts. We hope that what we learned from the people of Yamakoshi will help with the reconstruction."

forward to the future."

I want to make Rikuzentakata a place where young people's voices are heard gathering performers who were less active after the disaster to entertain and cheer up the local people.

She opened the "Young People's Congress" organized by the Youth Organization Council in response to the mayor's request for the opinions of young people regarding the rebuilding of the city. She has deepened the discussion of what Rikuzentakata should evolve into, and has sent a declaration to the city government.

"Most of the wreckage in Rikuzentakata has been cleared up, so now we must listen to the opinions of as many people as possible in order to proceed with the reconstruction," she told us. "We can't guarantee that there won't be future disasters, but we should work to make Rikuzentakata at least a little safer. We will hold discussions with young people once a month, and further build on our experiences to advise the mayor."
